### REACHING OUT WITH RUSSELL... on Faith/Trust

"Then [Abraham's servant] prayed, 'Lord, God of my master Abraham, make me successful today, and show kindness to my master Abraham."

Genesis 24:12

Hebrews 11 gives us a grand roll call of heroes of our faith: Abel, Noah, Abraham, Moses, Gideon, Samson, David, and others. But what about Abraham's servant whom Abraham sent to get a wife for his son, Isaac?

We don't even know his name but through his prayers and faith, God led him right to Rebekah; and their son Jacob, later renamed Israel, was the forefather of the Hebrew people. That unnamed servant acted with pretty heroic faith and he made a difference in this world.

Trusting faith is always prayer and action as this story of "Mower Faith" illustrates.

The fifth-grader watched her father struggling under the hot sun to cut the grass on the family's sizable yard. When he was finally done, she said to him, "Daddy, I wish we had a riding lawn mower. I'm going to buy you one." She did more than make what seemed like an impossible promise. She began praying for a riding mower for her dad. And she began doing odd jobs to earn money.

Finally the girl had saved up \$50, but everyone knew that wasn't enough. Then one day she and her mom saw a riding mower that was for sale. Skeptically, they took a closer look at the sign. They couldn't believe their eyes: \$50. And the mower worked!

In Genesis 24, we read the account of Abraham's servant seeking a bride for Isaac. He had the difficult task of finding a woman from a family hundreds of miles away. And she had to be willing to return with him to Canaan. He prayed specifically, did everything he could, and waited on the Lord.

Two seemingly impossible requests. Two faithful believers in prayer and action. It's a formula for great results.

Not all prayers are answered affirmatively, of course, but that isn't our concern. Our job is to see the need, ask God for help, and do what we can. We all need "mower" faith.

The heroes in Hebrews Roll of Faith, Abraham's servant, and the little fifth-grade daughter trusted God for their needs. It is never the amount of faith that we have or don't have that matters but in Whom we place that faith. That's trust. Jesus didn't say to His disciples, "Have more faith in God." He simply said, "Have faith in God" (Mark 11:22). We can trust God's answers if we will pray specifically, do all we can, and wait for Him. God desires to glorify Himself and to work out His good purposes through us. Even you and I can be one of God's heroes. Are you trusting Him?



### HOPE

Are these your thoughts?...

Ok, so yes, call me Cleopatra, the Queen of Denial.



I have hurts, hang-ups, and bad habits that I won't admit to and I have stuffed them for a long time. Now you tell me that I am powerless to heal myself from my hurts, hang-ups, and bad habits. So where is the hope?

Funny you should ask. Hope, that is the third topic we talk about in Celebrate Recovery.

Principle 2 tells me that I should earnestly believe that God exists, that I matter to Him, and that He has the power to help me recover. This principle is based on Matthew 5: "Happy are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted." And, Step 2 states we come to believe that a power greater than ourselves can restore us to sanity. Step 2 is supported by Philippians 2:13, for it is God who works in you to will and to act according to his good purpose.

Here is your English teacher question: what word is the same in both the Principle and the Step? The answer ... POWER. We don't have the power to change on our own; now, there is a depressing thought. However, God has the Power; we are not stuck in our human condition! This is our HOPE!

H -- CR celebrates the fact we have a Higher Power. What is a Higher Power? It is not crystals, the universe, the force, and certainly not ourselves. It is Jesus. If we let him, Jesus will help us. Jesus makes a standing offer. If we come to him, he will help us.

God is holding us in his existence. You don't have to worry about telling God anything He does not already know. He knows our hurts, hang-ups, and habits.

 $\mathcal{O}-$  The next part of our Hope is based on us. How open to change are you? Is your favorite phrase, "But I have always done it that way!" Ephesians 4:23-24 reminds us, "Now your attitudes and thoughts must all be constantly changing for the better. Yes, you must be a new and different person."

Remember the story of the Prodigal Son? Son decides he wants to do his own thing, takes his inheritance, moves to another county and parties all of his money away. Finding himself eating with the pigs, Son decides he wants to change. Where does Son turn for help? To his Father, who is waiting and watching for Son to return. The Father welcomes his Son back, gives him new clothes, and celebrates his Son's return.


What had to happen first? The Son had to be open to change

- $\it{P}$  -- We are lucky; God gives us the power to change. We don't have to worry about the power going out or having a backup generator. God provides what we need. For I can do everything God asks me to with the help of Christ who gives me the strength and the power. Philippians 4:13. At CR, we follow Paul's formula. I can do everything IF God ASKS me to do it, with Christ. This is asking God for power to do what He asks us to do. The same approach works for overcoming all of our hurts, hang-ups, and habits. God will show us what to do and will give us the power to do it.
- $\it E$  -- Now we are back to what we have to do expect to change. Paul presents this idea when writing to the Philippians by saying "And I am sure that God who began the good work within you will keep right on helping you grow in his grace until his task within you is finally finished on that day when Jesus Christ returns." (Philippians 1:6)

So where is our HOPE? It is in God our higher power, who gives us the power to change, if we are open to change and expecting to change. Our hope is that God is helping us to change.

This is not an instant zap; it is a journey. Celebrate Recovery is here to help you on this journey. Join us on Tuesday nights at 6:45 and meet others who are making this same journey.




