

Pastor's Note...

When we read about the temptations of Jesus in the wilderness we see two big things we need to remember. First, we see the temptations themselves and the broad categories within which all temptations fall: the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eye, and the pride of life.

But, more importantly than the temptations themselves we see how Jesus handled each one. And we see how integral the Holy Scriptures were in facing all three kinds of temptation.

Many of us have these responses memorized if not always applied to our times of testing. Read them out loud.

- 1. Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone but on every word that comes from the mouth of the LORD." (Luke 4: 4, Deuteronomy 8: 3)
- 2. Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Worship the Lord your God and serve him only.'" (Luke 4: 8, Deuteronomy 6: 13)
- 3. Jesus answered, "It is said: 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test.'" (Luke 4: 12, Deuteronomy 6: 16)

Yes, become very familiar with these responses so you can mimic Jesus when you are tempted.

Take advantage of this season of Lent and the way it points us towards the cross and that resurrection morning that changed everything for us. Use these forty days of Lent not only as a time when the temptations we face are revealed for what they are.

But, let this time be a time of resolve, a time of strategic preparation where we map out how we will overcome the temptations that have dogged us in the past.

Let this time be set aside for a changing of habits and choices. But, don't fall into the trap of making these choices temporary. What progress will you make if you have already decided to backtrack and go back to your old ways once these forty days are finished?

Make firm decisions and stick with them. If God is pleased with what you do during these forty days keep on being faithful.

Find someone to hold you to account. Or, if God has called you to do something in secret keep up with things yourself. Write it down so you can have a record of it to remind yourself of what you are doing.

Hold on to Jesus Christ – the author and finisher of your faith. And do not lose heart for you will reap a reward if you do not quit.

It's so good to know God loves you. And we have living proof He still does – Jesus, our Resurrected Lord! Yes, "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believes in Him will not perish but will have everlasting life." But Jesus is still demonstrating His love for us.

How? He is interceding for you and me, right now. Why? Because when someone loves you, they pray for you. And when they pray for you, they believe and secure God's best for you.

So, will you turn one good turn into another? As Jesus prays for you will you pray for others, starting with those of your own household and those who belong to the household of faith? Will you pray for and love others as you love yourself?

Listen to the Apostle Paul as he reminds us of the character of God's love.

"Love must be without hypocrisy. Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord.

Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. Share with the Lord's people who are in need. Practice hospitality. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse."

Romans 12: 9 - 14

Look at the priority of your love: serving the Lord. Don't forget that.

Why? Because Jesus said, "Worship the Lord your God and serve him only." (Luke 4: 8) Failing that you cannot truly love anyone as you should but when you love the Lord, love will see you through.



## CR - One of The Potter's Tools

Have you read a familiar Bible verse, a verse you could repeat by heart, but this time it really strikes a chord? Well, that happened at a recent CR meeting. Now I must confess it happened not while reading a verse but when watching the Maranatha Singers video

Change My Heart, oh Lord. (https://youtu.be/IlSmG-\_eJTU).

Change my heart, oh God, make it ever true. Change my heart, oh God, may I be like You You are the potter; I am the clay. Mold me and make me; this is what I pray Change my heart, oh God, make it ever true. Change my heart, oh God, may I be like You While the song played, pictures streamed across the screen of a potter creating a clay vessel. The potter working brought to mind the process of change with which we all struggle.

The potter starts with a glob of mud full of imperfections, powerless to change on its own. The clay, in denial, doesn't understand its flaws. The potter takes over, working the clay, pounding out air bubbles, kneading in water. With the added moisture, the potter starts to forms the clay. The water, like the word of God, is needed before a change can begin. The clay is centered on the wheel, just as we are centered in Christ.


The wheel spinning helping the potter to slowly and steadily work using his hands to form the pot. Just like the Holy Spirit working inside us, the potter puts his hands deep into the heart of the clay to pull it from a lump into the shape of a vase.

The potter applies a healthy amount of pressure as he continues to shape this lump of clay. Not only the potter's hands but several other tools help him in the process of forming the vase ... the wheel, more water, several scrapers. These are like the many tools that come into our lives to help us become the person God designed. The tools and pressures help

remove toxic qualities such as pride, arrogance, bad tempers, worry, lust, and struggles such as depression, co-dependency, and grief.

The final step, after spinning, dossing in water, pushing, prodding, shaping with tools, is fire. Yes, the potter takes a blow torch to the outside of his creation to stabilize the clay before putting the jar in a blazing hot oven for firing.

The potter doesn't see the glob of clay but the end product, a beautiful vessel. Join us every Tuesday where God uses his love and the tool of CR to mold us into His likeness and to help us work through our hurts, hang-ups, and harmful habits.

### St. Patrick

At the age of 16, Patrick was taken prisoner by a group of Irish raiders who were attacking his family's estate. They transported him to Ireland where he spent six years in captivity.

During this time, he worked as a shepherd, outdoors and away from people. Lonely and afraid, he turned to his religion for solace, becoming a devout Christian. (It is also believed that Patrick first began to dream of converting the Irish people to Christianity during his captivity.)

After more than six years as a prisoner, Patrick escaped. According to his writing, a voice—which he believed to be God's—spoke to him in a dream, telling him it was time to leave Ireland.

To do so, Patrick walked nearly 200 miles from County Mayo, where it is believed he was held, to the Irish coast. After escaping to Britain, Patrick reported that he experienced a second revelation—an angel in a dream tells him to return to Ireland as a missionary.


Soon after, Patrick began religious training, a course of study that lasted more than 15 years.

After his ordination as a priest, he was sent to Ireland with a dual mission: to minister to Christians already living in Ireland and to begin to convert the Irish.

St. Patrick Incorporated Irish Culture into Christian Lessons. Familiar with the Irish language and culture, Patrick chose to incorporate traditional ritual into his lessons of Christianity instead of attempting to eradicate native Irish beliefs. For instance, he used bonfires to celebrate Easter since the Irish were used to honoring their gods with fire. He also superimposed a sun, a powerful Irish symbol, onto the Christian cross to create what is now called a Celtic cross, so that veneration of the symbol would seem more natural to the Irish.

Although there were a small number of Christians on the island when Patrick arrived, most Irish practiced a nature-based pagan religion. The Irish culture centered around a rich tradition of oral legend and myth. When this is considered, it is no surprise that the story of Patrick's life became exaggerated over the centuries—spinning exciting tales to remember history has always been a part of the Irish way of life.
